

The INDIGENOUS PEOPLES RIGHTS INTERNATIONAL is a global Indigenous Peoples' Organization established in 2019 in response to the grave situation of Indigenous Peoples who are increasingly being criminalized, killed, disappeared, and subjected to the worst forms of violence.

We are leading and coordinating the Global Initiative to Address and Prevent Criminalization, Violence, and Impunity Against Indigenous Peoples. This is a global effort led by Indigenous Peoples to strengthen coordination, solidarity, and actions to prevent, respond to, and reduce acts of criminalization, violence, and impunity against indigenous peoples: and to provide better protection and access to justice for actual and potential victims not only as individuals but as collectives or communities.

IPRI works at global scale with a focus presently in six countries where violence against indigenous peoples is particularly serious:

- Brazil
- Colombia
- Democratic Republic of Congo
- India
- Mexico
- Philippines

Legal Defense and Sanctuary Fund (LDSF):

- Directly support and facilitate:
 - a) the physical safety and security of Indigenous individuals, communities and organizations;
 b) community struggles.
- Support and strengthen Indigenous Peoples' traditional justice and governance systems that protect and support those who suffer from criminalization.

Research and Publications:

- Document, analyze, and expose criminalization, violence against Indigenous Peoples and their organizations and institutions, and set up the database.
- Regularly publish reports, policy briefs and situationers to aid in advocacy and lobby campaigns.

Legal Policy and Advocacy:

- Organize campaigns to bring local struggles to the global level for solidarity, attention and actions.
- Convene and undertake advocacy activities in collaboration with Indigenous Peoples' Organizations, networks, human rights organizations, allies and other relevant actors to address situation of criminalization and impunity at national, regional and global levels.
- Work in partnership with human rights, Indigenous Peoples' Organizations and alliances and relevant human rights institutions, mechanisms and procedures.
- Develop advocacy materials, including digests, to enhance awareness on Indigenous Peoples' Rights, including legislation and jurisprudence, and support advocacies of Indigenous Peoples.

Communications:

- Raise awareness and highlight criminalization and rights violation of Indigenous Peoples with impunity to generate support and action at local, national, regional, global levels.
- Maximize traditional and social media channels to broaden IPRI's reach.

National and Regional Partnerships:

- Support and strengthen Indigenous Peoples' initiatives and partner with Indigenous Peoples' organizations and networks to address and prevent criminalization and human rights violations with impunity in focus countries, currently in India, Philippines, Democratic Republic of Congo, Mexico, Colombia, Brazil.
- Build partnerships and strengthen collaboration with Indigenous Peoples' organizations and networks at regional level, in particular, Latin America.
